

People with Disabilities Deserve More

SUPPORT SB2026 AND HB3569!

Governor Pritzker's budget proposal for FY24 earmarks **\$211M** to support people with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). **Only \$63.1M of that is NEW money for community agencies** that provide residential and day services to help thousands live safe, full and vibrant lives.

This doesn't cover changes in the job market, yearly minimum wage increases, or inflation.

- Direct support professionals (DSPs) dedicated to caring for people with disabilities are leaving for jobs that pay more to support their families.
- The state-commissioned <u>Guidehouse Rate Study</u> recommends that **DSP wages should be 150% of minimum wage.**
 - This equates to a **\$4 per hour DSP wage increase for FY24.**
 - The Governor's proposal supports only a \$1.50 per hour increase.

What is the IDD community seeking in FY24?

SB2026 and HB3569 would implement a \$4 per hour DSP wage increase beginning 1/1/24.

The ask is \$88.5M in addition to the Governor's Introduced Budget.

Support SB2026 and HB3569

You didn't create the problem, but you can help solve it for the nearly **300,000** people in Illinois with IDD, their families and the staff who support them. **It's time to get our priorities straight in Illinois.**

What is the status of the community system of support for people with disabilities?

- It's very fragile
- More than 12,400 people with disabilities remain on the PUNS wait list, not receiving any services.
- The state is moving 123 residents from the Choate state institution to the community system - where will they go?
 - Community agencies are forced to turn away new residents for lack of staff.
 - The state is not complying with the Ligas Court decree which mandates choice for care in community settings.
 - Meanwhile, the state is seeking to cut DSP hours nearly **3.8 million** of them! That's nearly **1,800** full time staff who would be cut.

IDD Community System in Crisis

Fifty-three community agencies serving people with IDD responded to a June 2022 survey:

14% Closed a reside setting in 2022 **Closed a residential**

72% Delaying service expansions due to staffing shortages

2,137 Unfilled positions because of low pay, averaging 40 unfilled positions per agency

28% Not accepting new admissions for services

25% DSP vacancy rate
